Parks, Recreation and Open Space

A new Comprehensive Plan for Parks, Recreation and Open Space will make it easier for people to access things like parks, playgrounds, and nature areas and focus on areas that aren't used much right now, like the Conestoga River and certain neighborhood streets and alleys. It will connect neighborhoods together in a way that helps the environment and is fair to everyone, especially those who haven't had as many opportunities in the past.

The following ideas guide how this plan will rethink the City's parks, public areas, and natural resources as one integrated system:

- Incorporate **environmental sustainability**, green infrastructure, and climate resilience into parks and open spaces.
- Ensure that all residents are within a **safe 10minute walk** of a "high quality" park.
- Increase connectivity of parks and open spaces to **enhance accessibility** and safety for active transportation mobility.
- Prioritize park and open space projects that improve accessibility for people of all ages and abilities and **emphasize inclusivity** and equity.
- **Increase adaptability** of parks and open spaces to accommodate current and future needs.
- Establish a plan for **long-term sustainability** of the City's public spaces to address resiliency, maintenance, programming, funding, and upgrades.

As new restaurants continue to open in Lancaster, some are moved to provide a memorable dining experience that stands out from the rest. 401 Prime on the ground level of the Press Building at the corner of Prince & Lemon Streets, is one of those places. It is the latest venture of an already successful and popular local restaurant group, that includes the Belvedere Inn, Josephine's and C'est La Vie.

The atmosphere is tastefully elegant, the service is attentive and professional, and the menu is carefully planned to include prime steaks with a la carte accompaniments, and more. It is important to note that 401 Prime is expensive, and it is not hard to spend well over one hundred dollars per person for your dinner, making it a great place to dine for a special occasion.

Your foodie reporter has discovered that the happy hour menu includes some delicious offerings and well crafted cocktails, available in the lounge area from 4 pm until 6 pm, Tuesday thru Saturday. It includes a 401 Prime Burger, Oysters on the Half Shell, French Dip, Lobster Roll, Pork Spare Ribs and a Prime Beef Hot Dog topped with Chili and Cheese.

The Happy Hour Libations menu is equally appealing, including a Chopin Dry Martini, a Makers Manhattan, and an Espresso Martini, along with a selection of local beers and featured wine pours. I thoroughly enjoyed the hot dog paired with a dry martini and look forward to trying the French Dip and Lobster Roll when I return.

Many Downtowners fondly remember Chef Ed Diller from Gypsy Kitchen at the Refectory of the Lancaster Theological Seminary, where often times we got together for lunch or enjoyed a dinner in the beautiful setting. We also remember Chef Ed and his staff catering our successful Fete D'Or event at the Ware Center when we gathered to celebrate Lancaster becoming an official age friendly city.

Ed and I get together monthly at different local restaurants to talk about our common interests of good food and local real estate activity. The Wolf Museum and Garden

After eleven years of developing the maturing native plant botanical garden, Downtowner Mary Lou Weaver Houser, along with many Downtowner garden volunteers, face the imminent sale of the Wolf Museum of Music and Art property. The museum board has shifted estate trust monies from maintaining the museum to offering music scholarships for young Lancaster students.

The future of the garden is uncertain.

There are three conservation easement options for the would-be property owner to consider in regards to the ongoing care of the garden. The garden volunteers will maintain its beauty until a sale transaction and further notification.

This community garden has been an oasis and outdoor living room for the neighborhood all throughout the pandemic. Frisbee, picnics, lawn concerts, garden tours, outdoor classrooms, and numerous Downtowner events are part of its history.

Since its installation in 2012, the pollinator and bird populations are thriving with all the food sources and places to raise young. The rain gardens collect stormwater to address the city's overflow challenge. And countless backyard gardens have benefitted from plant giveaways and native plant education.

A self-guiding garden brochure offers visitors a brief history of the unique estate property and the phases of garden design. The list of volunteer gardeners on the brochure includes many familiar names. Listed right, members of Downtowners are in **bold**.
