Remaining Seized!

One of the roles of the Downtowners Board is to lead the organization in envisioning broad directions. During the coming year, the Board will once again be engaged in strategic planning. We'll be inviting members to join us in asking what we want Downtowners to look like in five years, and envisioning ways to get to that point.

One of the roles of strategic planning is to look at our organization in its context and ask what that context might mean for how we should move forward. As part of that, we see the need to intentionally educate ourselves about issues of diversity, equity and inclusion, and how they affect our organization. We will be seeking conversations with folks who can help us examine ourselves.



One month ago, Downtowners' members received a message from the Board in response to the conversations going on in our city and our country sparked by the killing of George Floyd, which highlighted the racism of our society. As part of our strategic planning process, we will be asking the kinds of questions we raised in our June 15 message:

- How do we address the issues rooted in racism that affect the lives of older adults in our community?
- How do we understand and break down biases and barriers that have prevented our neighbors of color from engaging as members in our organization?
- How can we develop and demonstrate our commitment to a stronger and more inclusive community?

An expression that is often used in the proceedings of the United Nations is "to remain seized." If there's an issue or situation the committee or UN body has not resolved, they signal that this will remain on their agenda with the statement: "The UN remains seized of this issue." It means we haven't come to a conclusion, but we won't forget this.

For the Board of Lancaster Downtowners, how we as an organization address the reality of racism is not something we will quickly resolve. But it is something about which we will "remain seized."


Old Housing, New Needs
